Read At Home Logs

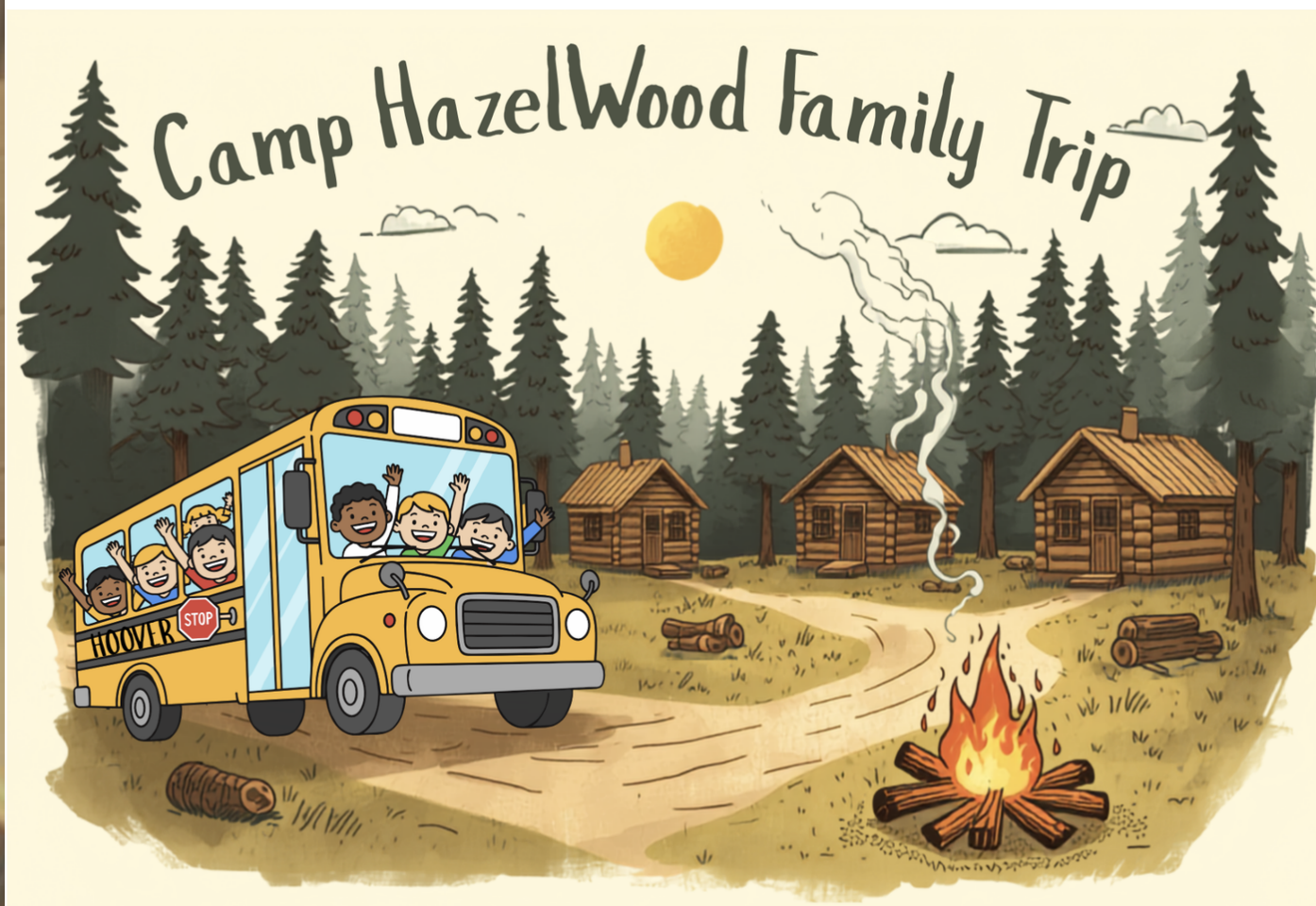

Picking Students Up Early

Our classrooms are teaching important curriculum lessons from bell to bell. It is important that students attend school for the entire day, from 8:05 to 3:10. Students coming in a half hour late or a half hour early on a regular basis are missing a significant part of their school day. We realize that there are appointments, and responsibilities that may mean you need to check your student out early or bring him/her to school late. Occasionally arriving later or being checked out early will not have an impact on your student's learning. If you are checking your student out early, please be sure to pick them up before 2:30. Our district policy asks that we not dismiss students after 2:30. Picking students up early, especially 10 -15 minutes early is disruptive and interrupts learning. Please refrain from picking up your students after 2:30.

Why Attendance Matters!

Attendance in elementary school plays a critical role in a child's academic success and overall development. Here are several reasons why it is so important:

1. Academic Achievement

- **Consistent Learning:** Regular attendance ensures that students are consistently exposed to the curriculum. Missing school leads to gaps in learning, making it harder for children to keep up with new material.
- **Skill Development:** Elementary school is when children build foundational skills in reading, writing, and math. Missing classes can hinder the development of these essential skills, which impacts future learning.

2. Social and Emotional Development

- **Social Interaction:** Elementary school is a time when children develop critical social skills, such as teamwork, communication, and conflict resolution. Regular attendance allows children to build relationships with peers, fostering emotional intelligence and cooperation.
- **Routine and Structure:** School attendance helps children establish routines, teaching them responsibility, time management, and the importance of following through on commitments.

3. Long-term Success

- **Habit Formation:** Good attendance habits developed in elementary school tend to carry over into middle and high school, influencing future academic and career success.
- **Reducing Dropout Risk:** Studies show that chronic absenteeism in the early years is often linked to higher dropout rates in later schooling.

4. Teacher-Student Connection

- **Supportive Relationships:** Teachers can better assess students' needs and provide tailored instruction when they see them regularly. Absenteeism limits the ability of teachers to form

strong, supportive relationships with students.

5. Building Responsibility

- **Accountability:** Attending school daily teaches students the importance of being accountable for their education, a lesson that applies to other areas of life as well.

6. Reducing Behavioral Problems

- **Structured Environment:** Students who attend school regularly benefit from the structured environment, which helps reduce behavioral issues. Absenteeism is often linked to an increase in behavioral problems both in school and at home.

In summary, regular attendance in elementary school is vital to a child's academic, social, and emotional growth. It sets the stage for lifelong learning, strong relationships, and the development of important life skills.

Birthday Celebrations At School

Birthdays are an important celebration for all of us! Our Hoover staff understands the significance of birthday celebrations. We want to recognize and celebrate these important milestones with our students, however we believe that birthday festivities are meant for home with friends and family! At Hoover we celebrate our students with a birthday announcement over the school PA and invite our birthday boys and girls to the office to receive their birthday trinkets. The best part of the day is during lunch when the whole lunchroom sings Happy Birthday while the birthday babies are on the stage.

Please note! Students may not bring treats to school to celebrate, as it can be distracting from the learning environment. One last note regarding birthday celebrations. If your family is holding a birthday celebration and want to invite your students classmates, there must be an invitation for every student in the class. If you are only inviting a few classmates, then those invitations should be distributed outside of the school setting.
